Keynote address **Delivering world class governance: key pointers from my Indian and Australian experience**

India is undergoing a major crisis of governance. Despite our rich cultural heritage, fertile land and abundant natural resources, we remain one of the poorest nations in the world. Nations much poorer than us in the past are doing ten times better. Most of this underperformance can be explained by governance that leaves much scope for improvement.

Conceived by well-known US expert Paul H. Appleby and Founded and promoted by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, IIPA (a society registered under the Societies Registration Act 1860), is a premier centre for Training and Research in Public Administration and Management.

India Policy Institute

India Policy Institute (IPI) is a trust registered in Hyderabad. It believes that India's poor performance is largely attributable to poor incentives (systems) and poorly designed policies. IPI issues policy documents from time to time, and has organised a 5-day workshop-cum-seminar in the past.

Who should attend?

This conference will identify causes of India's unsatisfactory governance and consider how these causes can be addressed. It is likely to be particular interest to senior policy makers and academics in public administration, economics and sociology.

However, its audience is more general. **All Indian citizens** who want to learn about good governance principles and practices which are commonplace in the West, but almost entirely absent in India, are a suitable audience for this conference. Participants will learn about a range of intuitive (and some not-so-intuitive) solutions to India's problems, enabling them to directly address such issues if they

have a direct capacity to implement such solutions, or demand that such issues be addressed in India.

Sanjeev Sabhlok, (Hony.) Executive Director IPI

The keynote speaker and moderator of the Conference is Sanjeev Sabhlok, (Hony) Executive Director of IPI. **With three decades of experience as a public servant in India and Australia, he is uniquely qualified to discuss governance reforms in India.**

He has extensive understanding and direct experience of best-practice frameworks in public administration, political system design and economic (and regulatory) policy, and is able to sharply identify critical shortcomings in India's policy and governance system.

Sanjeev Sabhlok's background

Sabhlok has a Post Graduate Diploma in Business from Australia and doctorate in economics from the University of Southern California. He is a former IAS officer (1982 batch) and served the Government of India as Professor of Management at the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, and the States of Assam and Meghalaya in various senior roles, the last of these being in the scale of Joint Secretary, Government of India.

Since leaving the IAS he works as a public servant in Victoria, Australia in the areas of economic and regulatory policy. In one of his roles he co-authored the Regulatory Change Measurement Manual, being the first methodology in the world that measures delay costs of regulation, in addition to substantive compliance and administrative costs.

Sabhlok is author of the 2008 *Breaking Free of Nehru* (Anthem Press), about which Gurcharan Das has written: "It must be read by every Indian".

Sabhlok writes extensively on public policy, particularly in the Mumbai-based magazine, *Freedom First*, and provides comments occasionally in the national press. He has also appeared on radio and TV. His blog, "Sanjeev Sabhlok's Revolutionary Blog" (<http://sabhlokcitiy.com/>) is one of India's more popular policy related blogs.

Key issues for discussion at the Conference

6) Transition from India's system to world-best system

- Issues during a possible transition, and how these can be managed.
